The WORLD, the FLESH and the DEVIL Introduction to Medieval Literature

This class will introduce you to the history, ideas, and literature of the so-called "Middle Ages" between classical antiquity and modernity. This period was in many ways a pre-eminently Christian age, but we will pay particular attention to the ways that Christian theological preoccupations--especially its apparently world-denying theology of sin--paradoxically laid the groundwork for secularity, whether conceived in terms of space (the world and worldliness) or time (life-span or *saeculum*).

Assessment

Essays: Four essays, 3-4 pages, each worth 12%. The goal of these assignments is for you to learn how to use textual evidence in a written paper, to practice doing close readings of literary texts, and to begin to learn how to make arguments through textual evidence. My emphasis is on improvement throughout the semester.

Midterm and Final: Exams test your level of engagement in the class. Are you doing the reading outside of class, and listening to lectures, taking notes, formulating your own thoughts in class?

Participation: Are you actively engaged in class? Are you asking questions, offering your own readings of texts, thoughts, etc.? The participation grade will assess that dimension of classroom performance. Attendance if, of course, a necessary feature of participation, although it is not sufficient!
